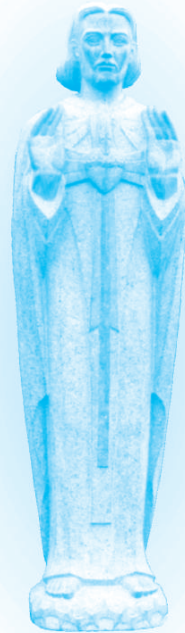

Seventh Week of Ordinary Time

On the **Seventh Sunday of Ordinary Time**, Jesus gives us one of the biggest challenges to living the Christian life: Love Your Enemies. "I say to you, offer no resistance to one who is evil. When someone strikes you on your right cheek, turn the other one as well."

Tuesday is the **Feast of the Chair of Saint Peter**, apostle, honoring Peter and all those who have served as Pope and Bishop of Rome. Wednesday is the **Memorial of Saint Polycarp, bishop and martyr**.

The **Seventh Week of Ordinary Time** offers beautiful readings from Sirach, part of the "Wisdom" literature in the Old Testament.

The **Gospel of Mark** brings us the narrative of Jesus healing a boy possessed, an evil spirit the Apostles could not drive out. "This kind can only come out through prayer." When the disciples argued over which of them was the greatest, Jesus tells them "If anyone wishes to be first, he shall be the last of all and the servant of all." He tells the apostles not to worry about those healing in the name of Jesus, "for whoever is not against us is for us." He gives them a vivid description of the challenges of following him. "If your hand causes you to sin, cut it off." When the Pharisees try to trap Jesus with a question about divorce, he replies, "What God has joined together, no human being must separate." He encourages us to be childlike before God in trust and love. "Whoever does not accept the Kingdom of God like a child will not enter it."

In the **Eighth Sunday of Ordinary Time**, Jesus gives us timeless and loving advice. Don't worry, don't fret. Our cares distract us from God unless we can place our worries directly in God's hands. "Your heavenly Father knows that you need them all. But seek first the kingdom of God and his righteousness, and all these things will be given you besides. Do not worry about tomorrow; tomorrow will take care of itself."

This week we see Jesus healing and teaching his disciples about the challenges of following him.

As we go through our week, in the smallest moments of the day, we can beg God for strength and courage in our lives. As we awaken in the morning, sort laundry or do the dishes, we can change our attitudes toward these chores and see them as sacred moments of invitation from the God who loves us with such fire and compassion.

Dear Lord, you know how I need healing. As you healed so many others, please touch my heart and help me to open my life, my heart and my soul to the love and healing you offer me. I know that if only I could trust in you more, it would change my life.

"I do believe! Help my unbelief!" Let me turn all of apprehensions over to you. I beg you to give me the wisdom and courage I need to trust more and to fear less. Teach me to feel your presence deeply in my life so I can stop clinging to my lack of courage and my fear. Let me release anything that holds me back from your love and the embrace of the freedom you offer me.

We can find the healing we so deeply want simply by asking God for it and then living as if we have received it. It is not about the amount of time we spend, but about an awareness of God's presence in our lives. Believing and trusting in that love and grace, we can find the humility to say, "I'm sorry" to someone we have hurt. We can take a moment to write a note or an e-mail telling a suffering friend we are praying for them.

And all day long, as we run our errands or sit at our desks, we can take a moment to say "Thank you" to the God on whom we have such an utter dependence and who loves us with such abandon.

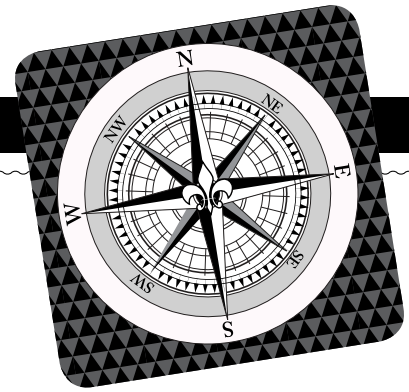
Former Soap-Opera Star Frank Runyeon

What Does It Mean to Follow Jesus?

The theme for the three readings this weekend serve as a primer, as it were, on how a Christian should live.

The passage in Leviticus (19:1–2, 17–18) provides guidance on how we should treat others: in order to be holy, don't hate anyone and don't bear a grudge; offer correction when needed, but always do so in love.

Then, First Corinthians (3:16–23) tells us how we should treat ourselves—as temples of God's Spirit. It also says that to be holy, we need to become fools for Christ, boasting in him, knowing that we have everything we need through him.

And last, Matthew 5:38–48 provides examples of how to live as a follower of Jesus: don't resist evildoers; if someone strikes you, don't retaliate. If people want what you have, give it to

them. Be willing to "go the extra mile" in all things.

There is nothing conventional about any of these readings. Nowhere do they suggest that it is acceptable simply to "follow the rules" or "do the minimum." Instead, each calls for maximum effort, the most that we can do. Each demands that we reject the "wisdom" of the world so that we can live fully in the wisdom of God.

The saints of the Church take these teachings to heart. They do ordinary things in an extraordinary way. So, what keeps us from taking these teachings to heart? Why do we have such trouble carrying out the instruction found in these readings?

What keeps us from being holy?



The Faith of the Church

When we think about the lives of those who have faithfully followed Christ, we are inspired to seek God's presence in the world with a new vigor and to find examples of how we are to live in this rapidly changing world. These holy men and women surround us. They are signs of hope that inspire us to be holy. By their witness they draw us to the Kingdom of God (Cf. Pope John Paul II's pastoral letter, *The Divine Teacher and Model of Perfection*).



Questions of the Week

Christians are called to live by the wisdom of faith, not by the wisdom of the world. This means showing love in place of hate, generosity in place of selfishness.

Adults

What is one thing I can do this week to remember to respond to hostile situations with love rather than anger or frustration?

Children

What is one thing I can do this week to be generous instead of selfish?

Responding to God's Word . . .

The records of the lives of saintly people are called "hagiographies"—stories of the holy. Many of these stories can seem greatly exaggerated. No wonder, instead of feeling empowered by them, some people say, "I could never be like that."

But the call to holiness found in the Gospel accounts is about doing ordinary things extraordinarily, not about doing the miraculous. We are called to give water to those who thirst, not walk on water; to feed those who hunger, not multiply loaves and fishes.

It's not that holy people don't do miraculous things, for they do; it's

that saints are so united with Christ, that *he* is able to do miraculous deeds through them. Unity with Christ is our goal.

Think about the various opportunities you have in your life to do ordinary things in extraordinary ways. How can you become more loving in everything you do? What can you do to practice forgiveness instead of retribution, generosity instead of selfishness, kindness instead of hostility?

It is by following Jesus' message in this way that we give witness to the presence of God in our lives. It is in this way that we will become holy.

SUGGESTIONS

Use one of these suggestions or one of your own to respond to God's Word this week.

In the home. Each day this week, go out of your way to share something you really love with other family members.

In the workplace or in school. Practice being kind this week: Open doors for people with their hands full; compliment others on their appearance; make coffee when the pot is empty. And don't look for praise!

In the community. Choose a group that provides services to the needy and then give generously of your time, talent, and treasure to the group.



Meditation Moment

Corrie ten Boom was a survivor of a Nazi concentration camp. After the war she toured Europe giving talks, urging rival nations to forgive one another. One night, after a talk in Munich, a man came up and extended his hand in a gesture of reconciliation. He was one of the most hated guards of the camp she'd been in. She couldn't take his hand. She prayed, "Jesus, help me! I can't forgive him!" Instantly, some higher power helped her to take his hand in forgiveness. That night Corrie learned a great truth. The same Jesus who taught us to love our enemies empowers us to do it. All we need do is ask for the power.

For reflection . . .

When was the last time I prayed for a person who had hurt me? Pick such a person now and pray for him or her.
